

# Formatting Guidelines for Extended Abstracts

Academic Conference

## **Beyond Borders: Central Asia in the Face of Climate Change, Water Scarcity, and Migration Challenges**

**15 – 16 October 2024 | Tashkent, Uzbekistan**

### **Length, Format, and Font**

Extended abstracts should be within a range of 700 – 1000 words, including a short abstract of maximum 200 words.

The extended abstract should be prepared using the **provided template**.

Tables, charts and references, except for the cover page, contribute to the word count.

The extended abstracts should be in Calibri font, 12pt and single-spaced.

Use single quotation marks and British English spelling throughout.

All figures and tables should be placed in the text on the page they are first referenced or on the following page.

### **Versions for Extended Abstracts**

The extended abstract should include a **cover page** with the names, affiliations and contact details of all authors, and three to six keywords.

On the next page following the cover page, the title of the extended abstract should be repeated.

Extended abstracts have to include the following sections:

Page 1: **Cover page**  
Page 2 and following: **Title of the extended abstract**  
**1 Introduction**  
**2 Data and methods**  
**3 Main results**  
**4 References**

THIS STRUCTURE IS OBLIGATORY! All headings should be in the same type size and font as the text as exemplified above. Please use the provided Word-Template.

File name: **first author\_website.pdf** (e.g., yoursurname\_website.pdf).

## Footnotes

No footnotes are allowed.

## Tables and Figures

- Not more than two tables and figures are allowed in the extended abstract.
- Each table and figure must be followed by a source statement, and must explicitly be referred to in the text.

## References

References are cited in the text by giving the name of the author and year of publication plus - in the case of quotations or an exact reference - the page number; all in parentheses: (SWINNEN 1997: 12) or (ZELLER et al. 1997).

- All publications cited in the text must be presented in an alphabetical list of references following the text of the extended abstract.
- The extended abstract should be carefully checked to ensure that the spelling of author's names and dates are exactly the same in the text as in the reference list.
- Internet Sources: Please give the full link and date of the download
- Use the abbreviation “et al.” (only) in the text if there are more than two authors.

For the different document types, the following formats should be used:
